

I read this book because both my father (a career soldier and horse cavalryman turned armor officer) and my father-in-law fought on this ground and carried so many memories home with them. As an avid reader of military history, I appreciated the author's candid willingness to cite the Allies failures and shortcomings, for those are what prepare us for success in future battles, whether the next day or decades away. Well researched and documented, this is not a read for someone interested in a war thrill story. However, taking the time to study provided maps throughout the book will put events and locations in perspective, helping to bring clarity to what has often been a ton of information readers must sort through alone.

Well written and well researched. Written by one who was close to the action at the command level and spoke with the surviving German commanders after the war. The author judiciously analyzes the claims of both sides. The discussion of how surprise was gained should be mandatory reading for military leaders. Not the book for you if you are looking for details of feats of arms or stories of individual or small group heroics. A few quibbles. There are a few, less than ten, glaring editorial errors. The maps are too few and so small as to be almost illegible.

The book is a very objective review of what happened before, during and after Operation Autumn Storm began. It reviews mistakes on both sides of the campaign with a fairly sober eye, and helps clarify what could be considered misconceptions fed by the John Wayne-type films that tended to be very one-sided. The only reason I don't give it five stars is, as the author notes very early, it's hard to do the campaign the justice it deserves in 200 pages. Otherwise it's probably the best all-around account I have read on the campaign.

An excellent, personal and knowledgeable, account of the Battle of the Bulge by a US Army intelligence officer who was present during the battle. He interviewed senior leaders from both sides and provides a balanced assessment of errors. successes and results, splendidly detailed, in the largest battle on the Western front in WW2.

This is a great book for a military historian, as it includes very specific details about divisions and placement. It lacks the personal stories that draw me to books about the war. If you like the details, this book is great for you. If your looking for heartfelt stories about soldiers in battle, you won't love this book.
