I have felt for some time that a good book about Dubai is very much needed, particularly a book that gives insight and understanding; sadly, this is not that book. This tome lives recklessly in that uncomfortable place between fawning and over fawning and preening and suffers from being blinded by the dazzle and glitz of Dubai and fails horribly to get under the skin of the emirate and come up with compelling answers to serious questions. Its fast-paced, is easy to read (perhaps too easy) and moves along at quite a lick without ever really stopping to reflect and see the Big Questions. In the light of the Arab Spring, turmoil in Syria and an increasing sense of despair in Egypt the book feels oddly outdated and out of touch. It goes on a familiar journey and down well

trodden paths and comes up with familiar, tired answers. I feel this story would probably best be told by Private Eye in its usual mix of cynicism and self righteousness (but amusing and self deprecating). The book delivers as a racy superficial account of the Dubai of a few years ago but lacks ambition (unlike Dubai) and balance (like Dubai). The UAE's 'favourite emirate still waits for a thoughtful, intelligent and broader more balanced analysis shorn of the rhetoric and romanticised notions that so clearly cloud the judgement of this book.

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
